Many years ago, a Christian professor named Stuart Blackie at the University of Edinburgh was listening to his students as they presented oral readings. After listening to a few of the students, one young man rose to begin his recitation. After the first few words, the professor stopped him and criticized him because he did not hold the book in his right hand. The student then shifted towards the professor, held up his arm and showed that he didn't have a right hand. The other students watched intently and uncomfortably.

For a moment the professor hesitated. He then made his way to the student, put his arm around him, and with tears streaming from his eyes told the student he didn't know. He asked the student for forgiveness and they became close friends. The professor's apology made a lasting impact on the student, and the professor was able to lead him to Christ. The student said the professor never would have been able to do that if he had not made

the wrong right. The professor could have downplayed what happened. He didn't do that and checked himself. Ever since the fall in the garden, there has been a lot of wrong. As Christians, Christ has forgiven us of our sins, but sometimes we slip and need to do as the professor did and check ourselves.

In January we're going to start off the new year with a series called "Check Yourself." A lot of times we don't have a problem checking someone else. The problem with that is we check someone else and have the background, context, and situation all wrong. We cause more confusion to an already confusing situation. What makes us different from everyone else is that our faith is not just practices. It is a relationship. It is a relationship with an all-knowing, all-loving, faith-perfecting God. There is a place for accountability in the church, but accountability begins with checking yourself and spending time with him.
